

11th Grade Summer Project: Biblical Worldview

In 11th grade, you will learn to develop a Biblical Worldview. Every person has a lens through which they understand the world. People use their worldview to make sense of reality. Without a worldview, a person can't find meaning in life. With the wrong worldview, a person will find the wrong meaning in life. God has given us the Bible to be our orienting narrative. Scripture enables us to see the world the way God wants us to see it. The goal of this course is to teach students to see the world through the lens of Scripture in order to live in the world the way God wants us to.

This summer, you will be challenged to read key passages of Scripture that help develop a framework for a biblical worldview. Each week, you will read a section of Scripture and answer questions about these Scriptures that help orient our view of God, the world, and our purpose in it.

INSTRUCTIONS:

Read each passage carefully and answer each question in complete sentences. Some questions may require only one or two sentences to answer while others may require a full paragraph to give a complete answer. Take time to consider each question carefully and how these Scriptures help develop your worldview.

Below is a suggested timeline along with your Scriptures and corresponding questions. We will be following the Storyline of Scripture: 1) Creation, 2) The Fall, 3) Redemption, and 4) New Creation.

Week 1: 6/28-7/4

Creation (Part 1)

Read Genesis 1:1-2:3

1) Look back at Genesis 1:1. Who/What is the subject?

2) What words/phrases do you see repeated in Genesis 1?

3) How might these repeated words/phrases inform a biblical view of creation?

Week 2: 7/5-7/11

Creation (Part 2)

Read Genesis 2:4-25

1) How is this description of creation similar/different from Genesis 1:26-28?

2) What does Genesis 2:15-17 tell us about God's purpose for man?

3) What does Genesis 2:18-25 tell us about God's purpose for man?

Week 3: 7/12-7/18

The Fall (Part 1)

Read Genesis 3:1-24

1) What is God's warning about the tree of the knowledge of good and evil?

2) In what ways does the Serpent seek to tempt Adam and Eve?

3) What are the consequences for their disobedience?

Week 4: 7/19-7/25

The Fall (Part 2)

Read Romans 3:9-18

1) What does this passage tell us about the human condition?

Read Ephesians 2:1-3

2) What does this passage tell us about the human condition?

3) How would you describe the human condition in your own words from what we see in these passages?

Week 5: 7/26-8/1

Redemption

Read Romans 5:12-19

1) What does this passage tell us about the effects of Adam's sin?

2) What does this passage tell us about the effects of Christ's death?

Read Romans 6:23

3) What does this verse tell us about death? AND What does this verse tell us about life?

Week: 8/2-8/8

New Creation

Read Revelation 21:1-8

1) What are some things that we get to eagerly wait for in the New Creation?

2) How does knowing about the future New Creation affect the way we live today?

3) What are some specific examples of things you look forward to experiencing or no longer experiencing in the New Creation?
